
strong conference will make us a better team and get us ready for the postseason."


"Last year we were very young with only three girls with varsity experience. We lost three great seniors to graduation, but have a lot of experience back," Phelps said.

Lauck said another strong point of the team is his assistant coaching staff.



"We need our seasoned veterans to continue to embrace their roles as leaders and teachers while not resting on their past success," he said.



Calton. "We return six of our seven varsity members from last year. We have some experience and we have some kids that have grinded in the offseason to get better."


Leading the Chiefs are seniors Truman Howell and Trey Taylor. They both qualified for the district tournament last year as juniors.





"He's qualified back-toback years now. He's consistently jumping over 6foot. One of his goals is to break the school record, which is 6-3.5. He is very, very close to doing that. He had an indoor meet that he was very close to jumping 6-4. It's just a matter of doing it," Cox said.

Sophomore Mason Howard had a solid freshman long jump campaign.

"We'll see if he can build on that," Cox said.

The Gophers lost top thrower Weston McKinley to graduation, who went on to continue his track and field career at Otterbein University.

Juniors Carter
Ruppright and Landon
Eaton are their two most
experienced returning
throwers. Aiden Hanson is
also back, but not as experienced as the other two.

"They've got big shoes to fill from a leadership perspective and a throwing perspective as well," Cox said.

Freshman Kaine Ruppright is in line for a huge season and is expected to be their best shot put and discus thrower by the end of the season, according to Cox.

Freshman Luke Stacklin

is a thrower that is still working on fine-tuning his technique, his coach said.

"We have four guys capable of throwing the discus over 100 feet, and he's one of them. To my knowledge, we've never had that kind of depth before," Cox said.

Junior Kolton Manns will be expected to contribute points in the 400. Cox said he has the potential to be a sub-55 400-meter runner.

Junior Kenny Feasel is one of their premier longer distance runners. Cox said they would like to see consistency from him this year.

Junior Dillon Hooker is a newcomer to the sport, and Cox figures he will run the 800 and be part of the relays.

Sophomore Weston Nichols has spent time bodybuilding and should develop into a good thrower.

"He's no longer going to be a sprinter like he used to be last year. He's bulked up so much and hasn't really worked on flexibility. He's tried shot put and he really likes it," Cox said. Sophomore Mason Swavel had a "solid freshman pole vaulting season," Cox said. He hopes Swavel can improve on his 8-6 height.

The Gophers have two foreign exchange students in Eldar Musayev and Joe Belhaj. Cox said he is not sure where they will fit in yet.

Freshman Memphis Harvey is splitting time with baseball and did pole vault in middle school. Freshman Maverick Dawson is also a baseballtrack dual-sport athlete that will run the 400.

Freshman Jacob Wallace was a 400/800 runner in junior high, and Cox said they will see where he best fits because it will be hard to do both in high school.

4x800 relay and possibly
the 800. Freshman Tanner
VanBuskirk will do the
short sprints and might be
on the 4x100 and 4x200
relays.

Sophomore Elle Livia Manns is coming off of a stellar freshman year that saw her place 12th in the girls high jump regional with a 4-10 personal record.

"The work ethic needs to match the talent. She has all the potential to be a phenomenal high jumper. It's just a matter of are we going to put in the work to do it, and we know we are capable of it," Cox said.

Sophomore Anna Ramsey placed at the district meet in high jump, and will score some points for the Gophers throughout the season.

Reis Mendenhall is the lone senior on the roster and a talented sprinter, but will split her time between softball and track.

Junior Lauren Wingfield was a thrower in junior high, but didn't come out for track until this year. "She's doing a good job for us already and will be one of our top throwers by the end of the season," Cox said.

Sophomore Kaytlin Billenstein also threw in junior high, but is a newcomer. Sophomore Zoey Miller will help out in shot put and discus. Sophomore Olivia Newland is a utility athlete for the track team, and will be playing softball this spring. She competes in a wide-range of events from shot put to relays to long jump.

Sophomore Kate Stahler is a short sprinter.

"She had a solid freshman year so we are looking forward to seeing her build on that in the 100 and the 200 and potentially in the relays," Cox said.

Sophomore Vaidea Knox is a pole vaulter, but had shoulder surgery in the offseason. Cox said she was recently cleared, so they're hoping she can contribute. If unable to vault, she will assist in relays and the short sprint events.

Freshman Kamy Kiser is a standout short sprinter.

"She ran indoor track and had a solid season. We are hoping that'll translate, especially in the 100. We're doing some 4x100 and 4x200 work as well," Cox said.
